The real estate market for the past week has been especially active. Sales in the city of Norwich...

The four petitions in bankruptcy for the week have total assets of \$13,277 and liabilities of \$12,285.

Permits were issued last week in the cities of New Haven, Hartford, Bridgeport, Waterbury and New Britain...

Among the plans for new buildings reported last week are factory buildings in Hartford, Bridgeport, Waterbury, Storrs and tenement blocks in Bridgeport, residences in Hartford and Greenfield, ice plant in Bridgeport, warehouse in Hartford, sewage disposal plant in Greenfield, block of stores in Greenfield, besides a number of one, two and three family houses.

Contracts let during the week include one, two, three and four-family houses in the larger cities with factory buildings in Bridgeport, Norwich, Hartford and Cheshire, apartment blocks in Hartford and Bridgeport, factories in New Britain, garage in Waterbury, residences in Hartford, Bridgeport, Greenfield and Riverdale, synagogue in Ansonia and a \$40,000 bathhouse in Saugatuck.

Norwich has six sales of real estate worth \$12,550 and \$7,000. In New London there were seven sales of realty last week for a total of \$12,200 last week to \$11,400 a year ago.

Peck, McWilliams Have Contract for Business Block on Thames Square—Edward Chappell Company Will Erect New Shed—H. E. Gardner Erecting New House at Lefingwell.

Peck, McWilliams have been awarded the contract for the erection of a new business block for the Eastern National Bank at the corner of West Main and North Thames streets, 89x70 feet and of brick masonry. The building will be used for stores, 89x70 and the old building now located at the site where the new one will be erected is being torn down completely. The foundation for the new building will be of stone and the basement will be cemented with all keystone thresholds to the building and side entrance will be of Monom or Oneco granite. All windows will have 2x2 inch columns of the building will be wood and will have cast iron caps and bases. The front, all the walls on the first and second floors will be plastered. The house is being raised and the roof will be covered with tar and gravel. Architects Cadworth & Woodworth drew the plans.

The Edward Chappell Co. are having plans drawn for the erection of a wagon shed and shop. The building will be a single story, 30x50. Cadworth & Thompson are working on the plans.

Undergoing Extensive Repairs. John Perkins is extensively renovating and remodeling his three houses on Mechanic street, No. 45, 38, 32, the latter is a double house. Two of the houses are being raised and new cellar foundations are being constructed and two are being entirely reconstructed. The interior of each of the houses will be repapered. Electric lights will be installed, new baths and all three will be placed in first class condition.

Repairing Brassil House. The house owned by Mary C. Brasill, located at No. 69 Mount Pleasant street, is being repaired. The building will be practically all new from the first story up and extensive repairs will take place.

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WEEKLY PEN PRODUCTION

Oregans Best Out the Record of Tom Barron's White Leghorns by One Egg.

Perhaps the most significant feature in the thirty-second week of the pen contest was the fact that a new high mark has been set for our weekly pen production. Nearly 5000 eggs were produced in the English White Leghorns laid 43 eggs in one week, thereby setting a weekly record that has not been even equaled until last week when the Agricultural College's pen of "Oregans" from Corvallis, Ore. laid 64 eggs, a production for the week of 21 1/2 per cent. G. Platt's White Leghorns from Wallingford, Pa. were second for the week with 50 eggs.

Fairfield Farm's Barred Rocks from Short Falls, N. H., Albert T. Lenzon's White Rocks from North Attleboro, Mass., and Joseph Brandenbury's Rhode Island Reds from Wayne, Mich., all tied for third place with 59 eggs each. All the pens taken together laid 4565 eggs as compared with 4148 for the corresponding week a year ago.
