Justice Capen gave a decision for the plaintiff to recover \$20. An appeal to the superior court was taken by the counsel for the defendant.

A Quiet Holiday Probable.
Willimantic will have a quiet Fourth of July, there being little scheduled to occur in the city, aside from the usual number of picnics and home gatherings, with one or two baseball games to entertain matters. A large number of people have signified their intentions of spending the day elsewhere, and the Norwich Preparatory school will attract many, while others count on attending the Mansfield celebration. Practically all business will be suspended during the day. The postoffice will be open until noon. There will be but one delivery by the city mail carrier, which will be made in the morning, while the R. E. D. service will be suspended.

SHORT OF AMMUNITION?
Returning But One Shot to Five in Struggle in Northern France.
Paris, July 3, 6:30 p. m.—The desperation of the struggle along the front of the allied offensive in northern France is shown in the progress made through what the official bulletin describe as the "line." This description is given in the report of the progress of the fighting in the front of the trenches called a labyrinth, connected with advanced posts heavily armored with concrete, in which machine guns were mounted while the trenches themselves are armored with turrets protecting other machine guns.
