**WORKMAN FALLS 25 FEET**  
**STRIKING ON PILE OF BRICKS**  
Louis Cacato Fractures Skull, When Window Frame Topples Over, Knocking Him From Scaffold.

Louis Cacato, of 26 Bank street, who is employed by Doyle & Murphy of this city as a laborer on the new building being built for the American Thread company between No. 5 and

No. 6 Mills, met with a serious accident while at work Saturday morning. He was engaged with other employees in knocking bricks off the wall on a level with the top of the windows of No. 6 mill. They were sitting on a scaffold and directly behind them were a number of window frames which had been taken from No. 6 mill. The frame just behind Cacato overturned, knocking him from the scaffold. He struck the window frame and fell with it on a heap of bricks, about twenty-five feet below. He struck on his head and neck. Several of the workmen rushed to his aid and he was taken to the first aid department. An ambulance was sent for and he was hurried to the hospital where it was found that he had sustained a fractured skull, a sprained back and a broken leg. At the hospital Sunday night it was said that he was doing as well as could be expected. Cacato is married and has three children.

### SWIMMING POOL READY.

Took Twelve Hours to Fill—Contains 30,000 Gallons.

The new swimming pool at the Y. M. C. A. is ready for use. Friday afternoon the water was turned into the pool, which took twelve hours to fill, the water being filtered and heated as it entered the pool. Saturday afternoon the water was refilled and is very clear. The pool holds thirty thousand gallons and the depth ranges from 3 1/2 feet to 7 1/2 feet. The pool is 17 by 45 feet and is one of the finest in the country.

### DISTRICT DEPUTY BERTH RESIGNS.

Knights of Columbus Official is Succeeded by William A. Costello.

Thomas F. Berth, who has been district deputy of District No. 4, of the Knights of Columbus in Eastern Connecticut which includes the councils of Danielson, Putnam, Moosup and Willimantic, has resigned. District Deputy W. J. Cronin of New Haven has appointed William A. Costello of Sun Joste council, No. 4, to succeed Mr. Berth.

**Civil Cases Do Not Come to Trial.**  
Two civil cases were to have been tried before Justice of the Peace Charles A. Capen, Saturday morning, but in one case an agreement was reached between the two parties, and in the other judgment was rendered by default. In the case of Samuel Bonin against Charles Richards, a suit for rent of tenement, an agreement was reached allowing the plaintiff to recover \$17 and costs, amounting to \$20.95. Attorney P. J. Danahy appeared for the plaintiff and Attorney S. B. Harvey for the defendant. The other case was that of A. J. Bowen against Michael and Fannie Ostro-

sky of Mansfield. The suit was to recover the amount of an unpaid premium of an insurance policy. The defendant did not put in appearance and judgment was rendered for Mr. Bowen for \$77 with costs, amounting to \$93.81.

### JITNEUR PAYS \$34 FOR RECKLESS DRIVING

James Angelopoulos, Followed by State Police, Fails to Heed Trolley Conductor's Signal to Stop.

James Angelopoulos, driver of the Willimantic-Hartford jitney, was before the local police court Saturday morning charged with operating a motor vehicle in a reckless manner. Angelopoulos has been under suspicion for some time and Friday afternoon two state officers followed him in an automobile as he left on his return trip to Hartford. They said in court on Saturday morning that Angelopoulos drove past intersecting streets at a rate of thirty miles an hour without blowing his horn. He was arrested by the entrance to the Willimantic cemetery, a short distance from the place where Harry Sklyer, a former Hartford jitney driver, crashed into a trolley killing one of his passengers. The trolley car from South Coventry due here at 4:15 had stopped to let a woman passenger get on. The running board was let down at the left, the side on which the automobile driven by Angelopoulos was approaching. The conductor of the trolley car says that he signalled the automobile to stop but that it was going at such a speed that it could not be stopped until it had passed the trolley. Officers Jackson and Downing corroborated the conductor's story. Angelopoulos pleaded not guilty to the charge of reckless driving. He said that he was 21 but had driven a car for six years.

He said he had always supposed that passengers always got on a trolley car on the right hand side and that was the reason he did not slow down when approaching the trolley. That this was the first time he had ever seen a passenger get on a trolley car from the left hand side. He admitted having been before the secretary of state for reckless driving. He was fined \$35 and costs amounting to \$34, which he paid.

**Vagrant Sent to Jail.**  
Michael Grady, charged with vagrancy, was given thirty days in jail. Grady told the court that he had been struck on the head a few days ago and since had been wandering around not knowing what he was doing. This was his second offense, the other time he was given a small fine, but this time got a jail sentence.

**Brooklyn For Four Idlers.**  
James Hill, Frank Fallon, Charles May, and Martin McGinty, arrested Friday in the rear of the Moose home, pleaded guilty to the charge of intoxication. Chief Richmond stated that they had been hanging around town for a week and that he had arrested two of them and let them go. Each was given thirty days in jail.
