Rare Blossoms. About ten feet north of the opera house is a plot of ground five or six clusters of Polygala polygama. They are up against the wall and scatter about in the grass. It was a peculiarity in that it has two sets of blossoms, one above and one below the ground and a number of blossoms below the surface on the roots. 
