

STATE G. A. R. GOING TO KANSAS CITY

Special Train to Leave Hartford for the National Encampment. A circular detailing the plans for the trip of the Connecticut members of the Grand Army of the Republic to Kansas City to the fiftieth national encampment, beginning August 28, has been sent out by Henry J. Sedley, of Bridgeport, department commander for Connecticut. The official route designated for the veterans of this state is the New York, New Haven and Hartford to New York, Lehigh Valley, by way of Niagara Falls, and the Grand Trunk to Chicago, and the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe to Kansas City. Special Pullmans and coaches will leave the West Twenty-third street ferry in New York at 2:50 p. m. Saturday, Aug. 26. The Connecticut delegation will go to New York on a special train leaving Hartford at 10:30 p. m. Niagara Falls will be passed during the day so the veterans will have an opportunity to view this scenic wonder. Chicago will be reached at 8:40 the next evening, and a two hour stop will be permitted before the trip to Kansas City is resumed. The circular recommends the following appointments as aides on the staff of the department commander: George C. Reynolds, New Haven; C. Samuel Stanton, Glastonbury; George E. Frye, Danbury; Isaac Hartson, Branford; and Peter Galder, Bridgeport.

HOUSES STONED AND SHOTS FIRED

Gang Driven Away by Guards at the Thames River Specialists Co. Saturday and Sunday were quiet at Montville around the plant of the Thames River Specialists company after the trouble that broke out about 10 o'clock Friday night when the men were thrown at two of the company's houses occupied by the families of men who have not struck with the Polish laborers who left their work a few days ago. The heads of these families have declined to join the strikers and as a consequence they believed the attack was made on their homes Friday night with stones. A number of windows were broken but no one was hit by the stone throwers. Constable M. J. Hickey, who with Special Officers Dimmock, Britton and Brown, has been on duty at the mill property, reported that the stone throwing and was prompt to hurry to the scene of the attack, which is some little distance from the paper mill. Several shots were fired in the darkness as the officers came up and they answered the fire but one on either side was hit and those who had made the retreat fled away in the darkness without being recognized or caught.

NEW YORK GUARDSMEN WILL MAN GUNS

Ninth Coast Defense Command to be Stationed at Fisher's Island. The United States coast defense guns at Fisher's Island will be manned by New York national guardsmen during the next few weeks. The Ninth coast defense command of the New York state militia, headed at 1:40 by Capt. J. H. Smith, left for New London, where it will be transported to Fisher's Island. The Ninth, 35 strong, and several other federal units after reporting to the president's call for guardsmen for Mexican border duty. It will be stationed at Fisher's Island by the Thirtieth Coast Defense Command of Brooklyn.

NAVAL MILITIA TO THIS SECTION

State Divisions Now On Sound Will Put In At New London. The annual fourteen day cruise of the Connecticut Naval militia began Saturday. The number of men who will receive training on the U. S. Virginia is limited on account of lack of accommodations. In all, 170 from Connecticut will get their training on the big battleship. The Amphibite will cruise along the coast, putting in probably at New London, Groton and Swanport. The Amphibite will probably be part of the defense against the attack by the German fleet. Putnam, Webster and Southbridge may well feel proud of having entertained the largest number of Chamber of commerce members ever brought together at a mid-summer outing in Connecticut, when 615 were abundantly provided for at a subsequent time. Norwich as usual led in point of numbers present, as well as sending the greater number of automobiles, having 54 to her credit, 200 tickets were allotted the local committee and but a remained unused when the parade lined up on Washington street, Thursday morning.
