Election Fraud Cases. THROWN OUT OF COURT. Fourteen Men Were Under Indictment at Coventry, R. I. Providence, R. I., July 29.—The cases of 14 Coventry men under indictment charging fraud in connection with the election of Congressman Walter H. Stinson in November, 1914 were thrown out of court yesterday by a decision of Federal Judge Brown. The government had demurred to the defendants. The court ruled that the federal government was without jurisdiction to prosecute the election fraud cases pending before the court upon which the decision is expected to have little effect.
