Remored Ruling for Open Cars. As late as Sunday many of those who ship milk from this city to Boston had not heard of the ruling in favor of "open" cars by the interstate commerce commission, which, during the spring, gave a hearing in this city to farmers and representatives of agricultural and dairying organizations that wanted to be heard on the subject.

L. H. Hooley, secretary of the state board of agriculture, said Sunday afternoon at his home in North Woodstock that he had heard nothing of the decision, but that he was delighted to know that such a report was current. We have been fighting for the open cars, he said, and unless the business is too badly cut up in Boston, he should be able to get better prices for our milk than we have been able to secure from the contractors.

Mr. Healey said that in the past there has been opportunity for milk producers in this section of the country to get business from the big hotels in Boston, but to do this they would have to ship by express or by bag, and the price in the latter case what are known as L. U. L. rates, these being so high compared with the cartage rate that it is almost impossible for the producer to ship in competition with the contractors.
