Business Arbitration COURT IN CHICAGO To Deal With Questions of Law in Commercial Cases.

Chicago, July 29.—A business arbitration court, said to be the first of its kind, will be inaugurated in Chicago Monday. The court is being organized by the judges of the municipal court, who adopted a rule placing that court in the arbitration of disputes. The new tribunal will have jurisdiction in all cases of law in commercial disputes. Questions of fact are to be decided outside of the court by arbitration boards of experts selected from the various trades and industries. The findings of fact of the experts will be binding both upon the arbitrators and the judge of the court of arbitration.
