IN NORWICH FIFTY YEARS AGO. Transportation Company Building Another Iron Steamboat For Norwich Line—Drill Season at Shore Resorts—Annual Willimantic Camp Meeting Due—Fire in Leach Building Prevented By Vigilant Policeman.

These items from the files of the Bulletin 50 years ago recall some of the incidents of that time. Aug. 26.—Col. McCord has just received orders from General Prentiss for an encampment of the First State State Militia at North Meadow, Hartford, to commence September 10, 1866, and continue six days, for purpose of drill, discipline, inspection and review.

Col. McCord has appointed Rev. Edgar F. Clark of the Sackam street church, Norwich Falls, chaplain of the Third regiment. Among the sufferers by the fire at 76 Fulton street, New York city, Friday night, were Leach and partner in the publishing business of Henry Bill of this city, and John G. Cooley, formerly of this city.

Presented Church to Fitchville. Mrs. Fanny Raymond, a sister of the late Asa Fitch, has purchased the Fitchville church, his administrator, and will have it remain as the village church. The price is stated to have been \$9,000.

Yale Professors at Willimantic. Prof. Dana and Silliman of Yale have been geologizing at Willimantic. As the six o'clock train from Norwich was approaching Plainfield station on Friday morning, it came in collision with a wagon driven by Marshall Smith of Canterbury at the crossing near the station, demolishing the wagon and throwing Mr. Smith some 15 or 20 feet, and so Mr. Smith breaking his head and shoulders, and being severely injured.
