
Mrs. Mary A. C. Norton Presents the Complete Set of Twenty-Two Volumes.

SACRED HEART DEDICATION SUNDAY

Bishop Nilan to Deliver Dedication Address Sunday—Organ Recital in the Evening by Prof. Louis Bouvier of Montreal—Many Visiting Clergymen Will Take Part in Exercises—Those Who Made the Handsome Church a Reality.

The dedication of the newly erected Sacred Heart church, Tatfville, will be held Sunday morning at 10:30. The dedication address will be delivered by Rt. Rev. John Joseph Nilan of the Hartford diocese. The celebrant of the high mass will be Rev. C. H. Paquette of New Haven, formerly of Tatfville. He will be assisted by Rev. Joseph Cournoyer of Waterbury and Rev. Aime Troie of Pierrefield, N. Y. The master of ceremonies will be Rev. Philippe Massicotte of Tatfville. The Sacred Heart church which is to be dedicated to one of the most beautiful edifices in a town the size of Tatfville in the state. The building of the church was started in April, 1915, under the supervision of A. Frouseau of Tatfville, who had charge of the building of St. Mary's church in Beate at the time Rev. V. D. Bellerose was rector of the Beate church.

Seating Capacity 300. The church is of Roman style, with a Campanile tower 115 feet high, with clock and bell. The seating capacity of the church is 300. The architect is T. G. O'Connell of Boston. The basement is of ashlar stone from Proctor, Wt. and the brickwork is wire-cut Burlington bricks. The trimmings are of white terra cotta, with copper gutters and cornices, and the church has a slate roof. The steps leading to the church are of Vermont granite. The windows are of ornamental glass. The dimensions of the building are 129x70 feet.

The inside finishings are of hand-carved oak. The three altars are of Bialco. The main ceiling is of paneled oak with dropped beams of the same material. The side ceilings are vaulted and of plaster and stucco work. The pulpit, altar rail and pews are of hand-carved oak. The floor is of maple, with ground cork runners.

The sanctuary dome is 50 feet high and is finished in plaster and stucco, with hand-painted tableaux. The niche back of the altar is lighted by chandeliers of stained glass. The lighting of the church is by electricity, indirect system. The heating is well ventilated and is heated by steam.

At the east end of the church is the chapel, which is 40x60 feet, and is finished in oak to correspond with the rest of the building. The whole building is equipped with panic bar doors which automatically spring open at a pressure on the panic bar. The organ and stately have been donated by various persons and societies.

FIFTH COMPANY TO OPEN DRILL SEASON.

Forty-eight Drills a Year is Called for by Federal Orders.

At a special meeting of the Fifth company, C. A. C. N. G., at the armory on Friday evening Capt. W. G. Tarbox announced the new drill regulations which will be carried out in the future. The militia are now under federal orders and to secure the federal pay the company must drill 48 times a year. For the first month or two it will be necessary for the Fifth company to drill twice a week in order to get the required 48 drills. Drill nights are to be Wednesday and Friday. The new regulations call for an attendance of 41 men and two officers, at each drill. The privates will receive in the neighborhood of a dollar a drill and the men will receive pay on two different periods. The drill season will start on Friday night, Sept. 1. A half dozen recruits were received into the company ranks at the meeting.

Following the business session, the company enjoyed a social hour during which a beautiful lunch was served. The committee in charge comprised Corporal Turner, chairman, Corporal Bartolucci, Private Edredgo and Private Finckler. Lieutenant Herriek of the 1st Haven was present at the meeting.

Friday night the recruits for the first baseball team were given a try-out. They were divided into first class opens. As soon as the baseball season opens up they are going to be in the best of condition and will be ready to meet all comers from all parts of the state. They will not bar any team. AUTO OWNER IS SUED FOR \$15,000

Nellie Walsh Brings Action for Damages in Accident at Eastern Point.

Nellie Walsh of New York has brought suit against Margaret Fullerton of Washington for \$15,000 for injuries received as the result of an automobile accident. She was struck by an automobile near the Hotel Griswold the day before last.

The plaintiff alleges that on June 22 she was crossing Shore avenue when an automobile owned by the defendant struck and knocked her down. She sustained a fracture of the left arm, a fracture of the right leg, fracture of several ribs and a fracture of the pelvic bone. She claims that she has suffered and will continue to suffer great mental and bodily pain and that she is permanently injured.

She was confined to the hospital for several weeks and she was incapacitated from her work at a hotel where she received \$2 a month besides her board, lodging and laundry.

The plaintiff claims that the accident was due to the negligence and dangerous driving of the chauffeur, who was operating the machine at a high rate of speed and failed to slow down to 10 miles per hour at the intersection of the road, failed to blow his horn, failed to keep a proper lookout and failed to keep on the right hand side of the highway, and did not have the car under proper control.

Papers in the suit have been served by Deputy Sheriff J. H. Tubbs and are returnable before the superior court of this county the first Tuesday in September.
