## SWEDISH CHURCH STEEPLE HIT BY LIGHTNING BOLT

Pastor Peterson Felt the Shock and Rang Alarm—Fire in Columbia.

About 5:30 o'clock Sunday afternoon Willimantic was visited by one of the worst electrical storms that has been seen in this vicinity for many years. Accompanying the lightning was a severe hail storm that lasted but a few minutes. The telephone lines that extend into the country were put out of order as well as the lights of the city which were put into condition later in the evening. The trolley cars, coming into the city were made life on account of the dirt and water on the track.

The track under the railroad bridge near the Third company's plant suffered greater damage than any other part along the line as the dirt washed down from the side hill and remained on the track to a depth of six or eight inches. Most of the sewers in the city were clogged up and in such condition the water stood about them to a depth of four or five inches. Superintendent Moulton soon had a force of men at work cleaning out these places and late in the evening everything was in first class condition.

Some of the trees about the city were affected by the storm. A limb of a tree on Bridge street fell across the walk and had to be removed. On Main street a tree was

knocked down and obstructed traffic for some time.

In the midst of the storm or about 6:45 the steeple of the Swedish church was struck by the lightning and immediately caught fire. Rev. F. A. Peterson, of Norwich, John Carlson and Ernest Johnson were in the church at the time the bolt struck and immediately rang in the alarm. Rev. Peterson stated that he felt a slight shock on his head and on looking up discovered that the top of the church was ablaze.

There was some difficulty in telling where the bolt was used, as it was struck by a number of different numbers were rung in. This caused quite a delay in the arrival of the fire companies upon the scene. It was not long after the arrival of the fire companies before water was being played on the fire from three or four different lines of hose.

It did not take long after the fire broke out for the people living in the neighboring houses to seek a place of safety, although these houses were not damaged by any extent. Water was played on the roof of these houses to keep the flying sparks from doing any damage.

The church which is almost completely ruined was erected about 25 years ago. What is left of it now stands on the corner of Oak and Summit streets. Although the fire walls are standing the interior of the church is completely ruined as the result of the fire, the roof is burned to a considerable extent and the steeple is about to topple over.

Rev. F. A. Peterson, who is pastor of the church, stated that in all probability there would be a meeting of the directors today, when it will be decided what course to pursue. The damage is estimated at nearly \$3,000.

The recall of the fire was rung in at nine o'clock.

Some after the breaking out of the fire in the Swedish church another fire was seen in the vicinity of Columbia but as all telephones in that town are out of order it was impossible to locate the exact spot of the fire. It was reported later in the evening that this fire was a barn burning to a man named King that lives on the old Columbia road. The barn was totally destroyed.

## PARALYSIS LOOKING UP.

Dr. Jenkins Says Situation in Willimantic Is Better.

City Health Officer Dr. Charles A. Jenkins stated Sunday afternoon that the epidemic of typhoid fever in this city has made no change except for the better. The two cases that are within the city limits are improving very rapidly and a complete recovery is looked for in both cases.

In regard to clothes being brought to this city from the infected districts for the local laundrymen, the doctor stated that when the city was first put under quarantine he forbade such clothes being brought in. A number of towns in this vicinity are now issuing orders to the same effect.
