STATE GUARDSMEN TO CONTEST FOR TROPHY Citizens of Iliou, N. Y., Make Gift to Connecticut National Guard.

A small bronze statue, the gift of the citizens of Iliou, N. Y., to the National Guard of Connecticut in commemoration and celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the making of the first Remington rifle at Iliou, was received Wednesday at the office of Adjutant General George M. Cole.

The statue was cast from an original Albin Polasek, a Bohemian sculptor, and it stands three feet high, including the ebony base. It portrays the sure and elegant Remington, Jr., the maker of the original rifle.

At the base of the statue is a bronze plate bearing the following inscription: Remington Centennial, 1816-1916. Trophy.

For proficiency in marksmanship, presented by the National Guard of Connecticut, to the Organized Militia of the United States for Perpetual Commemoration.

The making of the first Remington rifle at the town of Iliou, in 1816, marked the beginning of the firearms industry in America. It is in reverence to the memory of Eliphalet Remington, Jr., that the town of Iliou has presented the statue to the National Guard of Connecticut.
