TWO NURSES SECURED TO VISIT CITY HOMES.

Will Examine All Children and Report to Health Officer Jenkins - Orders Issued.

City Health Officer Dr. C. A. Jenkins has issued the following order in regard to the paralysis situation in Willimantic:

1-All fruit or vegetables exposed for sale must be properly screened, otherwise same will be condemned as unfit for human consumption.

2-Children under 16 years of age must be excluded from churches, Sunday schools, theatres or public gatherings until further notice.

3-Children should be prevented from handling cats and dogs. These orders, which will be rigidly enforced, are the outcome of a conference of the mayor and the health officer held Tuesday evening.

There has been only one case of the disease reported to the officials in the last 24 hours, and that a mild one.

AMERICAN RAILWAYS. Figures Showing Amount of Business Handled, Capital Invested and Importance Compared With Those of Other Nations.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 6.—[Illustrating figures setting forth the extent of business handled, the vast capital invested and the importance of the railway systems of the United States compared with those of other nations are given in today's bulletin issued by the National Geographic Society from its Washington headquarters.]

With its more than a quarter of a million miles of railroads (457,559) on June 30, 1915, the United States of America leads every other nation in the world by more than 50,000 miles.

The length of tracks, including sidings, is 1,000,000 or more miles. The enormous total of 331,000 miles—enough to reach from the earth to the moon and back more than 100 times—encompasses the globe six times. Over these tracks 55,000 locomotives are operated, drawing 3,327,000 cars.
