A Provocational Grammar Building For Seventh and Eight Grades is One of Greatest Needs of City's Educational System, Says Annual Report of Superintendent Edward J. Graham—Manual Training and Domestic Science Proving Important Courses—Chief Items of Repairs to School Buildings.

That a central provocation grammar school building for the seventh and eighth grades is the greatest need of the local educational system is the statement made by Superintendent Edward J. Graham in his annual report to the town school committee and the citizens of Norwich.

The first section of the report considers in a brief way certain phases of the work and conditions in our schools for the year 1915. The section contains the following statistics with reference to teachers, enrollment, graduates, buildings and finance.

Setting and instructive courses in our educational system. The manual training has been changed during the year. At first the pupils were required to make a number of type forms each week...

During the winter term a group of boys from the sixth grade in the Mount Pleasant School who were over-age for their grade and were losing interest in their school work were sent to the manual training room for one hour's work each week.

During the spring term, a Home Garden Club was organized, the objects of which were to interest and help the children in garden work to give them wholesome, helpful employment during the summer vacation...

When the superintendent's reports were received in October, 1915, and the age and grade chart was compiled, it was found that the retardation of pupils in our school system had been reduced 2.3 per cent since September, 1913, when the study was begun.
