SHOULD STAND BY REPUBLICANS. Colored Speaker Says There Never Was a Time When the Race Should be More Loyal to Party Principles Than at Present Time—Says Democratic Party is Negro's Avowed Enemy—McKinley Avenue Church Crowded at Big Mass Meeting Monday Evening.

There never was a time in all our history when we as a race should be more loyal and steadfast to the principles of the republican party than they are at this time. Dr. Williams H. Higgins of Providence in a thrilling address on racial and political matters delivered at the mass meeting held Monday evening, under the auspices of the Norwich Equal Rights League, in the McKinley Ave. A. M. E. Zion church. The church was taxed to its seating capacity and during intervals Prof. Fred S. Jones rendered musical selections. William A. Fields, president of the league presided.

I come here tonight to advocate the principles and policy of a political party which has done more for the negro than any other party during the past half century. I come here to speak to you as a former slave of the south, to speak to you as a man who has lived in the south as an advocate of an untried proposition; but I come as an humble citizen of this country to speak to you as a man who has lived in the north as an advocate of a tried proposition.

Only Capable of Small Things? But why should we be surprised? Is it not a fact that Mr. Wilson and his party are only capable of doing small things? He has studiously avoided the attempt to pass any proposition concentrating the power of the forces of the United States against the real enemies, Mexico and Germany, but he has been busy with a little we, the negro republic like Haiti and San Domingo and says: "What which you have, shall take away from us."

Negroes Unjustly Discharged. Mr. Wilson and his associates had no objection to the negroes being discharged from the army and navy during the past two years before they began a "general housecleaning" not only in Washington and its departments but throughout the entire country, including territories and foreign countries where negroes were holding responsible positions.

Compensation Agreements. Eight Were Signed Monday by Commissioner Donohue. On Monday eight compensation agreements were signed by Compensation Commissioner James J. Donohue. The agreements are for: Hollbrook, Cabot and Wells, New London, and Combridg, Gales Ferry. He was injured August 5 and the award was \$10 weekly, from August 16.

He was coming up Fox Hill in front of Herbert Hummel's and the automobile was going to the city. The horse was hit and cut, the shafts were broken up and the steps and one wheel hit the spokes. The auto was not much damaged.
