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Thirteen Suits For Superior Court Big Damage Actions Against the Deutschland Filed Yesterday With Clerk Parsons—New London Woman Sues Husband For Divorce on Grounds of Intolerable Cruelty—Marion Williams Wants \$10,000 for Injuries Received in Auto Accident.

Papers in thirteen suits were filed with Clerk Parsons in the superior court office in this city on Friday. Several of the suits are actions brought against the German merchantman Deutschland, which ran into and sank one of the Scott company tugs, T. A. Scott Jr., recently. The suits brought against the Deutschland are as follows:

Charles S. Amador, adm. of the estate of William A. Cason, who was drowned when the crew of which he was a member went down with the tug, vs. the German Ocean Navigation company, Ltd., of Germany, owner of the Deutschland. Damages are asked for \$1,300 and asks damages of \$1,300.

A Ray Button of Griswold has brought suit against Lucius Brown, executor of the estate of Lucy Abby Lewis of Griswold. He claims he rendered services for her from Dec. 1, 1912, to Feb. 4, 1915, and has never been paid. He estimates his services as reasonably worth \$3,200 and asks damages of \$3,200.

New London Woman Wants Divorce. Annie Dipolonia of New London asks the court to grant her a divorce from her husband, John Dipolonia, of New London, on grounds of intolerable cruelty. They have three minor children and she asks custody of the children.

The Savings Bank of New London has filed action against John B. Carleton et al. of New London for foreclosure of mortgaged property in New London. The property was mortgaged to secure a note made out by the defendant on Nov. 25, 1914, for the sum of \$50,000.

The Savings Bank of New London has also filed suit against Dennis J. Carleton et al. for recovery on several notes. One is dated Nov. 25, 1914, the face is \$1,500 and the rate 5 per cent. The second is dated March 2, 1901, the face is \$1,000 and the rate 4 per cent. The fourth is for \$1,000 and is dated March 31, 1901.
