LAKE STREET PLAYGROUNDS SAFE

Common Council Indefinitely Postpones Resolution Authorizing Public Works Committee to Use Property for City Barn—Resolution Passed Fixes Holyhock Island as the New Location—Many Opposed Lake Street Project at Special Hearing in Council Chamber.

After an hour's deliberation on the objection raised to the abolition of the Lake street playgrounds and the locating thereon of buildings for the use of the accommodation of the city's warms, arts and tools, the council on Wednesday night authorized the public works committee to take over the property for the use of the department, and adopted a new resolution fixing Holyhock Island as the location for the city barn, which is presently occupied by the city.

Over a half hundred prominent men crowded the council chamber when the hearing of several thousand dollars advanced of the opportunity to the city. A half dozen women were numbered among those present.

After the resolution had been read, Mayor Brown said that the matter was one for the council to settle, but as there appeared to be some sentiment against the project it was decided to place the matter in the hands of the public works committee.

City Barn Property Valuable. The mayor said the city barn is located right in the center of the city and is a valuable piece of property. The city barn does not provide room enough for all the wagons and the needs of the department do not permit of its always being properly stored.

He pointed out that the only two buildings in the city, the Holyhock Island and the Lake street playgrounds. The Lake street playgrounds are long to the city and was acquired at the expense of several thousand dollars.

Could Erect Wooden Buildings. Mayor Brown said the building of sheds would be of no material cost to the city. He said he understood that the Lake street playgrounds are within the fire limits and that wooden buildings could be erected there.
