THE WEATHER

Conditions. The winds along the north and middle Atlantic coasts will be strong

MILITARY UNIT ESTABLISHED AT STORRS COLLEGE

Primary Object to Qualify Students for Reserve Officers.

People of the state of Connecticut should be interested in a recent innovation at their state college, says Charles B. Amory, Jr., captain of the University of Cambridge, who held a foundation scholarship in St. John's college. He took two degrees at Cambridge—bachelor of arts and bachelor of science.

The primary object of the establishment of this unit of the reserve officers' training corps is to qualify students at civil institutions for reserve officers by systematic and standardized instruction prescribed to these students a standardized measure of fitness for military service.

In order to prepare them to perform intelligently the duties of commissioned officers in the military forces of the United States. It enables them to be thus trained with the least practicable interference with their civil careers.

It is hoped that every educational institution will endeavor to establish a unit of the reserve officers' training corps in order that in time of national emergency there may be a sufficient number of reserve officers trained in military science and tactics to officer and lead intelligently the reserve officers' training corps of the safety of the country will depend.

I think Connecticut should be proud to be among the first to do so.

In order for a unit to be established at an institution the authorities must agree to maintain a compulsory course in military training of three hours a week for its freshmen and sophomores and to arrange its curriculum so that those who are admitted to the institution may enter it with a minimum of delay.

If a citizen of the United States and physically fit, becomes a member of the reserve officers' training corps, he is furnished with a uniform and necessary equipment.

For two years he devotes three hours a week to military training, which follows a prescribed course. On the completion of these two years, if he so desires, he may continue his training at an institution for an additional second year to devote five hours a week to an advanced course in military training for the two remaining years of his college course, and to pursue such camp training as shall be prescribed by the secretary of war.

Those who complete this course will be paid an estimated to be about \$9 a month. The summer camp training as at present contemplated will consist of two camps during the summer months, one for periods of four weeks each. All the students' expenses, including transportation, assistance, will be paid.

After graduating from the course, by appointment by the president of the United States, for additional military training, an additional second lieutenant for a period of six months, with pay of \$100 a month, and for assignment to an organization of the regular army for instruction. A graduate is also eligible for a commission in the officers' reserve corps, and it is hoped that all who graduate will avail themselves of it as a patriotic duty.

BOARD FOR BLIND FINANCES ARE STRONGER

Ninety-three Persons Were Registered With Board During Year.

The board of education for the blind has filed its report for the year ended December 31, 1916, as compared with the activities of the board for the year ended last year. The number of registrations for the year ended December 31, 1916, was 93, as compared with 81 for the year ended December 31, 1915.

The secretary of state has announced a change in connection with the registration of the state police. The registration of the state police will be taken care of by the state police department. State Police Commissioner R. W. Wheeler has heretofore been actively connected with the department, but his connection in this respect ceases. Hereafter special assignments of state police to investigate cases will be asked for.
