But the city auditor points out in his report that the city's debt, with interest charges, already amounts to \$5,705,800 and that the addition to this of \$3,294,200 would bring the debt up to the extreme limit allowed by the law of the state. Under the circumstances the proposed bond issue of \$6,000,000 would put the city's debt \$3,000,000 above the limit which has been set for sound financing.
