NORWICH BUREAU SHOWS THE LARGEST GAIN

Nearly 2,400 Positions Were Filled During Last Year.

Free public employment bureau figures show that approximately 25,866 people secured places in Connecticut last year through these bureaus. This number is more than twice that of 1916 when 11,338 people obtained work through the state bureaus.

The greatest gain in securing employment was made in the bureau at Norwich. In 1915, only 644 positions were filled and 1,965 applications for work and 735 applications from employers received.

Will Open Sundays Unless All Close. New London Merchants Threaten to Do Business Seven Days a Week.

Threats on the part of certain proprietors of large stores in Bank and Main streets, New London, to keep their places of business open seven days a week, unless a few violators of the Sunday closing law are forced by the authorities to suspend business on Sunday, give promise of precipitating a heated controversy between the police and the merchants in question.

About three weeks ago orders were issued through the office of Prosecuting Attorney Daniel M. Cronin and delivered to 24 merchants on Bank

and Main streets, warning them that future violations of the Sunday laws in keeping their business establishments open, would result in prosecution in the police court.

With but few exceptions the order was obeyed. A choice few continued to carry on business on Sunday and are said to have kept their stores open throughout the entire day.

When the law-abiding merchants learned of the probable defiance of their competitors they are understood to have visited the police and civic officials and made the threats mentioned.

Thus far no action has been taken by the police in bringing about the prosecution of the Sunday violators. Whether the matter will reach the court probably rests upon the action of the merchants next Sunday.

No Monument at Soldiers' Home Plot. Many residents of Noroton are disappointed that, among the bills introduced at the general assembly, none was presented in an effort to obtain a state appropriation for a soldiers' monument in the cemetery at Noroton, where the veterans from Fitch's Home lie buried in a hollow square.

This plan of burial, it is said, was adopted in the expectation that some day such a monument would be reared in the center. The project has been frequently discussed, and was revived during recent months, but nothing has come of it. Surely some local people, or the veterans still living at the

home, or the officers of that institution should inaugurate such a movement, since the state bodies of the Grand Army of the Republic or of the Sons of Veterans do not seem disposed to proceed with the matter.

If the plan is vigorously pushed, and some responsible organization is formed, which will present such a measure to the general assembly two years hence, it may be possible to obtain an appropriation from the state for the purpose before the last of the Civil war veterans is laid beneath the sod.

Norwalk Home. Mysterious Break. A mysterious break occurred at the New London freight house of the Central Vermont railroad directly across the tracks from the New Haven railroad station some time during Wednesday night. Entrance to the building was gained by forcing a rear window.

A small amount of money in the cash drawer was undisturbed and several crates of goods, including condensed milk and cigars, were opened, but the contents were found intact.
