**STORM DELAYS TRAFFIC**  
Trains Late—Trolleys Keep Pretty Well to Schedule—Snow Drifts in Places.

A small sized blizzard Monday affected the traffic on the railroad and trolley lines to some extent. The trains arriving during the afternoon and evening were away at schedule, the train from Hartford which is supposed to arrive here at about 5 o'clock was reported as being one hour and a half late from New Britain. It arrived here over two hours late.

The trolley company had their plow at work on the South Coventry line during the day in an endeavor to keep this line open. The regular trolley was running some minutes late and had new crew on the regular crew working on the snow plow.

Superintendent J. S. Sullivan had a force of men at work keeping the gutters free from the fast falling snow and shoveling crosswalks on Main street. The small plow was sent out during the afternoon in order to clear up the sidewalks and the gutters. In some places on Main street where side ways run onto the street the snow had drifted to a depth of a foot and more. The walk on the High street side of the town had suffered from the drifting of the snow to a great extent. The walk was cleaned off at noon but at 3 o'clock the snow had drifted to a depth of over a foot.

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**TRADERS BOUGHT HEAVILY IN THE STOCK MARKET**  
There was a Broad Demand for Supplies of All Descriptions.

New York, Feb. 5.—Basing their operations on the assumption that rupture with Germany is calculated to create a broad demand for supplies of all descriptions, traders again bought heavily today of the better known "war brides" and related issues listed on the stock exchange.

The query extended to the "curb" or outside market, where many of the munitions and ordnance shares have broader and more general scope. On the other exchange, where the more necessary commodities are dealt in, the trend of prices was uncertain.

In the stock market the rise, while quite general and impressive as to certain issues, was so variable as to indicate indecision respecting the speculative possibilities of former favorites. Some issues prominent in the feverish trading of the past two years made only small gains and a few others of the same class were under pressure.

For the most part the buying was confident and seemed to have the support of foreign banking interests. Money rates were comparatively easy, regardless of last week's material reduction of local bank reserves.

The rise might have been convincing had it been shared in greater degree by rails, which were backward when not irregular. A new low record for New Haven, which fell to 39, accompanied by a revival of familiar rumors, served as a partial drawback in that quarter. Further adverse features were presented by the new low records established by International bonds issued by Great Britain and France in connection with the war.

**REPUBLICAN LEADER MANN OPPOSED TO SPECIAL CENSUS**  
Of Marriage and Divorce Statistics—Would Cost \$200,000.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Republican Leader Mann opposing in the house today a bill that involved \$200,000 for a special census work on marriage and divorce statistics declared that we know in all probability we will soon be called on to "appropriate huge sums of money" and "we should draw the line on all appropriations we can do without."

**IS MEMBERS OF CREWS LEAVE GERMAN SHIPS**  
They Took Advantage of Privilege Accorded by U. S. Government.

New York, Feb. 5.—Only 18 members of the crews of the German ships here who are now held aboard the vessel by the federal authorities, took advantage today of the privilege accorded them by the government of leaving the vessels by applying to the immigration authorities for admission to this country.

Seventy seamen and a steward who asked to be admitted were taken to Ellis Island, passed the necessary examination and were allowed to enter the country. It was expected that more would follow the same course tomorrow. In the meantime the German ships were still under heavy guard tonight and none of the seamen were permitted to leave.

Immigration officials explained that it always has been customary to place seamen on ships arriving in this country to see that members of the crew who did not signify their intention to re-ship out of the country in a reasonable time, were kept on board. In the past, those agreeing to the stipulation have been permitted to go ashore. The status of those on board the German ships differs in no respect, it was made clear, from that of seamen just arrived, although force of circumstances had kept them in this port two years and a half.
