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INTERVIEW WITH GERMAN MINISTER OF THE INTERIOR.

Consider Submarine Warfare Effective in Shortening War.

Berlin, Feb. 6. (By Wireless to Sayville).—In an interview with a Norwegian correspondent, as given out here by the Overseas News agency, Dr. Kaas, minister of the interior, said: "We consider submarine warfare to be an effective means of breaking the war and ending once and for all tyranny on the seas. It is thought that neutrals will have to suffer in some respects from the submarine war, but do they not suffer already? You can be sure that the difficulties caused to your country by our submarine war will be little compared with those caused by Great Britain."

"Ask your own countrymen," Dr. Hefferich continued, "by what brutal methods Great Britain coerces Norwegian ship owners to carry contraband, and how with all means she strangles the Norwegian fishing industry, as well as paralyzing Norwegian industries by holding back coal. We shall do everything in order to diminish these difficulties. We know that the coal question is most important for you. Notwithstanding the difficulties from which we now suffer in regard to transportation we shall help you as we can."

Annual Town Meeting Was Adjourned Until March 6—Will of the Late David C. Anderson Admitted to Probate—Thomas J. Bannon Appointed Appraiser.

The annual financial town meeting of the electors of Westery called for 10 o'clock Tuesday morning at the town hall in Westery was adjourned until March 6. At the present session of the general assembly of Rhode Island an act was passed changing the time of the financial town meeting from the Tuesday after the first Monday in May to the Tuesday after the first Monday in February, but according to Town Treasurer Pendleton, the present efficient time had not been given for the town officers to prepare their annual reports. For this reason the meeting was postponed, but not until a resolution calling for the passage of legislation necessary to provide for biennial elections of all town officers was adopted.

Town Treasurer Pendleton said that the town in the state had already changed from annual to biennial elections, and Westery in doing the same would be taking step that would be advantageous to the administration of town affairs and would adopt a general line of progress. The general assembly, however, has not yet passed the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, in the judgment of this meeting, the financial and prudential affairs of the town could be more conveniently administered and its duties, imposed by law, more efficiently performed, if the town officers were elected biennially; now, therefore, be it resolved, That the general assembly, in general assembly be, and they hereby are, requested and advised to prepare and secure the passage of the appropriate and necessary legislation to provide for the election of town officers.

The continuation in office of the present town officers until the choice of their successors at a town election to be held on Nov. 5, 1917.

2. The election on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1917, and biennially thereafter, of the town officers as the electors of the town are by law required or empowered to elect and choose.

There was much discussion over the date for the adjourned meeting, when the reporting officers will be heard. Councilman Maurice W. Flynn, who has advocated holding the financial town meetings in the evening, so that the laboring classes may have an opportunity to take part in the discussion of town affairs as well as the business men, spoke in favor of holding the meeting on the evening of March 6. Thomas H. Peabody was of the opinion that it would be better to hold the meetings in the evening, but when a vote was taken by acclamation the proposition for the farmers and many of the electors residing on the outskirts of the village to attend the meeting in the evening, Councilman Flynn had noticed that it was easy enough to get them to attend party caucuses in the evening, even if they had to be brought in on stretchers.

AMERICAN COLLEGE WORLD TO OFFER SERVICES.

In Event of War Will Tender Trained Scientific Resources.

Philadelphia, Feb. 6.—Preliminary steps were taken here today to put at the disposal of the national government, in the event of war, the trained scientific resources of the American College World, a group of scientists of the Wharton school of the University of Pennsylvania and a member of the advisory committee of the board of directors for the state of New York for the consulting board, today issued a call for a conference in Washington next Saturday of representative alumni of all the leading universities and colleges in America to organize an intercollegiate intelligence bureau whose object is to mobilize the "trained human resources" of the country.

NOT TO INTERFERE WITH THE FEEDING OF BELGIANS

Categorical Assurances Given by the German Government.

London, Feb. 6, 5.55 p. m.—Categorical assurances from the German government that it does not intend to interfere with the feeding of civilians in Belgium and northern France were received today at the local office of the Belgian Relief Commission. Under these assurances, it was stated, the German government would continue to enforce its rules requiring every person who enters the building to have a pass or be escorted by watchmen, were the only visible signs that the nation faces a grave international peril.

CHARLES J. HEXAMER PLEDGES LOYALTY TO UNITED STATES.

President of the National German-American Alliance.

Philadelphia, Feb. 6.—Charles J. Hexamer, president of the National German-American Alliance, whose membership in the United States is said to be three million, pledged his loyalty to this country today in reply to criticism because of his advocacy of a referendum vote of the people before war can be declared. Mr. Hexamer authorized the following statement: "If it came to war, I would stand firmly behind the United States and would uphold anything this, my country, might set out to do. I do not think, however, any country should declare war without the issue being first decided by the referendum."

SWITZERLAND ORGANIZING A MERCHANT FLEET

To Transport Food from Abroad—A Number of Vessels Leased.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Inland Switzerland is providing a number of merchant fleet to transport food from abroad. Despatches to the commerce department today in a number of vessels were being leased by the Swiss government from neutral European ports to be put to immediate service. The ships will operate under their own national flags as use of the Swiss flag would require the consent of the contracting parties of the Hague convention, practically an impossibility under war conditions.
