
The torpedoing of the Palm Leaf was reported from London last night. She was last reported as having left Sabine Pass, Tex., Jan. 1 for Dartmouth.

COAST GUARD DISMISSES UNNATURALIZED GERMANS In Accordance With Orders Issued at Washington. San Francisco, Feb. 7.—Unnaturalized Germans in the United States coast guard and light-house services were dismissed here today in accordance with orders issued at Washington. All men discharged had made declaration of intention to become citizens but had not taken out their final papers. It was said similar orders would be carried into effect in the United States transport service.

The liner left here Jan. 27 with passengers and cargo, calling at Kirkwall for inspection by British authorities.

Duke of the Abruzzi Asks to Be Relieved. Rome, via Paris, Feb. 7, 5:15 p. m.—The Duke of the Abruzzi has requested that he be relieved of the command of the Italian fleet. He will be replaced by Vice Admiral Paolo Thaon di Revel, who will also assume the duty of chief of the general staff of the navy.
