SENATE VOTES CONFIDENCE IN PRESIDENT WILSON

Approved Severance of Relations With Germany—Vote Stood 78 to 5.

Washington, Feb. 7.—President Wilson's severance of diplomatic relations with Germany was approved formally today by the senate, 78 to 5.

Senate Votes Confidence in President. The senate expressed confidence in the president's course, adopting a suggestion adopted by Chairman Stone of the foreign relations committee endorsing the withdrawal of American Ambassador Gerard from Berlin and giving to German Ambassador Bernstorff his pass papers.

These Who Disanted. Senators who voted against the resolution were: Democrats—Kirby of Arkansas and Vandaman of Mississippi.

Five Hours of Debate. Five hours of debate preceded the vote but the only active opposition came from the five members who stood out against the resolution when the roll was called.

Whereas, the president has, for the reasons stated in his address, delivered to the congress in joint session on February 3, 1917, severed diplomatic relations with the imperial German government by the recall of the American ambassador at Berlin and by the handing of his passports to the German ambassador at Washington, and
