BRITAIN TO ASK NEW CREDIT OF \$2,750,000,000. Necessary to Carry on War Amount Sought is First Installment for 1918.

London, Feb. 9.—The parliamentary papers today announce that the government will ask a supplemental vote of credit for \$1,000,000,000 for war expenses to March 31, and also a vote of credit of \$1,750,000,000 as a first installment of the amount required for the year ending in March of 1918.

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TO MEET TOWARD

Provided Fulton Defeats Charley Weimert Next Saturday Night—Fight to go Ten Rounds and Will Be Staged in New York.

Albany, N. Y., Feb. 9.—An agreement for a ten round boxing bout between Jess Willard, world's heavyweight champion, and Fred Fulton, at Madison Square Garden, N. Y., March 26, conditional upon Fulton's victory over Genebell Weimert next Monday night, was announced here today by Grant Hugh Brown of New York.

The license granted to Brown and his associates is dependent on their meeting the objections of the attorney general's office to the terms of the lease of Madison Square Garden, Chairman Frederick A. Wenck of the athletic commission and Brown conferred with Deputy Attorney General M. E. Lewis, who pointed out that the lease did not conform to the provisions of the athletic commission law in that the persons did not show that the Tower Garden corporation is the owner of Madison Square Garden.

CAPTAIN HUSTON OUTLINES MILITARY DUTY FOR PLAYERS Suggests Military Instruction Take the Place of Morning Practice.

New York, Feb. 9.—A plan to give all baseball players military training the time they arrive at their southern camps up to the world's series was outlined today by Captain Hugh Huston of the New York Americans.

Minor league players affiliated with the Players' Fraternity and pledged to support Dave Fultz in his strike movement against organized baseball.

It is not denied that the major league players are willing to lend their support to the minors in their fight, but it is not clear that they will do so in a manner satisfactory to both sides.

DEMOCRATS IN CAUCUS FAIL OF AGREEMENT On the Administration Revenue Bill—Senator Overman Proposed \$500,000,000 Bond Issue.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Democratic senators were in caucus tonight until a late hour of the administration revenue bill without reaching an agreement. They adjourned until tomorrow night when administration leaders expect to see approved a measure similar to the house bill, which would provide for a \$500,000,000 bond issue and for an excess profit tax and increased inheritance taxes, to raise approximately \$250,000,000.
