FIRST AID SOCIETY SERGES

Committee Meeting With Success in Preparation for the Taking of the Military Census in Norwich—Stenographers and Typists Will Help Prepare Card Index—Unit System Favored at Important Meeting in Council Chamber.

The patriotic spirit is not lacking in Norwich. The military census committee appointed by Mayor Allyn L. Brown had hardly adjourned its organization meeting on Monday afternoon when stenographers and typists of the city were offering their services and evening the chairman of the clerical committee, L. M. Crandall, was able to announce that the census would be taken in the city on Monday afternoon.

After the census is taken, the patriotic and love of freedom and Old Glory, the flag that never has and never will be lowered, will be the order of the day as long as red blood surges through the veins of the American youth.

Committee Responds to Call. Fired by the spirit of patriotism a score or more of Norwich citizens, the majority of them business men with their spare time voluntarily offered their services to the committee which Mayor Brown has appointed to assist the governor in the military census of the state of Connecticut. While no outbreak of hostilities is expected, it is hoped that while it is hoped that war may be averted, yet Connecticut, whose troops are being sent to the front, should not be left a blank page in the history of the world.

Census Does Not Obligate. The military census is not intended to obligate a man or boy in any way to serve in the army. It is the most feasible method of gathering intelligence and data regarding the state's military resources and resources in time of actual need. It is earnestly hoped that every man and boy over the age of sixteen years will voluntarily provide the information asked for and sign the cards which will be provided for this purpose.

Just what the census cards will call for could not be ascertained on Monday morning. The cards had not yet been prepared and it is expected that they will arrive in town today or very soon afterwards.

Organization Meeting Held. The committee announced Monday morning by Mayor Brown held their first meeting in the council chamber on Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock with Mayor Brown presiding, when formal organization was effected and actual work begun.

Mayor Brown read a circular letter received Monday morning from Hartford, explaining in detail the method that is being followed there. This method has been adopted in Hartford with a few minor changes it has been adopted by the city of Norwich. Chairmen Constituted Executive Committee. It was voted that the chairman of all the sub-committees constitute an executive committee with Mayor Brown as general chairman and First Selectman G. S. Dunsen as vice chairman.

It was also voted that the names of any man or boy over 16 years of age who shall refuse to give the information asked for on the card or sign his name to the census card, shall be placed with the police department.

The meeting then adjourned subject to the call of the committee.
