Lascivious Carriage. The report was accepted and tabled for calendar. No State Constabulary. Unfavorable report came from the judiciary on the act to create a state mounted constabulary. The report was accepted and bill rejected. Thames River Bridge. The house concurred with the senate in favor of the reconstruction of the railroad bridge over the Thames river and recommended its passage, and that the senate be referred to the appropriation committee. Licensed Junk Dealers. The judiciary committee favorably reported an act concerning junk dealers, which refers to the cities and towns of the state. The acceptance of the report by the senate was concurred in by the house, and the measure was tabled for calendar and printing. Representative Curry in Wreck. Representative William T. Curry, of Lebanon, spent the week end with his son and grandchildren in Chicopee. On his way to Hartford, Monday morning on a trolley car, he was struck by a car from Springfield, when another car from track directly crossing, crashed into the car in which Mr. Curry was a passenger, and his car was considerably smashed. None of the passengers was seriously injured. Calendar Business. There was calendar business on the house calendar Tuesday, but none were started for action. Pomerantz and Greenblatt. The committee on forfeited rights reported on a bill to restore forfeited rights, which were lost by reason of constant secretary. The bill included the application of Nathan Pomerantz, convicted of perjury, and Baruch Greenblatt, receiving stolen goods, both of New London. SENATOR BARNES PRESIDES. Many Resolutions Appointing Judges and Deputies Were Considered by Senate. Shortly after the senate session had opened, Lieutenant Governor Wilson, called Senator Barnes, of Norwich, to preside over the senate while the resolution appointing him judge of the city court of Norwich was acted upon.

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IF YOU EARN \$3,000. NOTARY COLLECTOR. All Returns Must Be Filed on or Before March 1. On or before March 1, 1917, all persons whose net income is \$3,000 or over must file a return with Collector of Internal Revenue, William H. Farwell, at the office of the collector, 100 State street. The law differs this year from that of others. According to the present federal laws, if a person owns federal bonds or any kind of securities, the collector will make it his duty to bring the figure over or including the return to the collector. If the income of a married man does not exceed \$4,000 he is not required to pay the tax, but the return must be filed just the same. It is the aim of the federal authorities to get a line on all people who earn more than \$3,000 a year, and who are all are not required to pay the income tax. In case a tax is to be levied on stocks or bonds, the holders will be required to pay 1 per cent, while the other 1 per cent, netting the government 2 per cent on all taxable securities.

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

Freeman favors use of American ships. Nation should at once begin construction of a huge navy.

Freeman favors use of American ships. Nation should at once begin construction of a huge navy. Congressman Freeman is taking a prominent part in the house debate of late. Recently he made an argument against armed merchant ships being recognized as peaceful vessels. He said: "While it is true that in most games the rules cannot be changed during the progress of the game, yet it is equally true that in the game of war the rules are constantly changed by the proclamations and regulations of powerful belligerents, and also by the proclamations of powerful neutrals, and such changes have afterwards become recognized and well established international law. The United States of America, a neutral nation, now has in its power to make a most essential and most beneficial change in the rules of international law. We have now the opportunity to protect our neutral ports of the world. It has always been true that war vessels of belligerent nations have been denied privileges in neutral ports, and it is true that the peaceful merchantmen of the belligerent nations have been treated as neutrals in neutral ports. It appears during the progress of this war that a merchantman lawfully engaged in commerce with international law of the past, is now practically a battleship for offensive purposes against a submarine. At the moment it emerges from the depths, it is most desirable for the United States to establish a principle that armed merchantmen shall no longer be considered peaceful merchantmen, it will redound immensely to the protection and security of our nation in the future. The submarine should have the right to come to the surface of the ocean and to challenge without danger a peaceful merchantman to stop. It should have the right in safety to visit and search a vessel held to it. I hope the time will soon come when all nations will realize that the submarine must allow the crew and passengers—men, women and children—to proceed in the conclusion of this war, and perhaps during it, the rule may be established that a submarine may without danger order the crew of a merchantman to throw overboard munitions of war and contraband and then must permit the ship to proceed in safety to a port if its destruction would endanger lives. We may by taking a firm stand upon this matter, change the rules of international law even during the progress of this war, so that submarines may warn without danger, may search and visit, and may destroy munitions of war, and yet the lives of non-combatants may not be put in jeopardy." (Applause.) "Later in the debate he spoke again after being yielded three minutes by Mr. Butler.
