FINANCIAL AND COMMERCIAL MARKET WAS ACTIVE United States Steel Contributed Over 20 Per Cent of Total Operations.

New York, March 21.—The many additional advances registered today were accompanied by another very large volume of business in which signs of a re-awakening of public interest were wholly lacking. The fact that one stock—United States Steel—contributed over 20 per cent of the total operations, which aggregated 1,335,000 shares, detracted in a measure from the impressiveness of the day.

Among the more striking features of the session were Bethlehem Steel, the new stock of which rose 1 1/4 points, the old 146. United States Steel rose to its best price thus far this year, making an extreme gain of 2 1/2 to 117, at which quotation it closed on the day of its absorption of large lots.

Other strong industrials were Glessco, Sheffield Steel, Crucible Steel, Lackawanna, and United States Steel. The public iron and Colorado Fuel at extreme gains of 2 to 6 points, with 2 for equipment, an average of 3 for industrial alcohol and International Agricultural Chemicals preferred. Most of these were prominent than usual, that group being featured by International Nickel at a gain of 2-3 points to 46 5/8.
