VIOLATIONS OF EXCISE LAW AT PLATTSBURGH
Charge Made by Captain Baer of the Second United States Cavalry.

Albany, N. Y., March 22.—Charges of attempted bribery and violations of the excise law in the vicinity of the military camp at Plattsburgh were made by Captain J. A. Baer of the Second United States Cavalry, in charge of the regular army of the United States military reservation at Plattsburgh or land nearby used as a training camp.

Captain Baer said he made his opposition at the direction of the war department. All of his charges, he declared, could be substantiated by records at the Plattsburgh post.

"The war department," he said, "is planning to have four camps of 15,000 men each, from all parts of the country, at Plattsburgh next summer. Of the total probably 35,000 will be boys between the ages of 16 and 20. It is a call for volunteers should come and it looks now as if one would come most any time. Plattsburgh would be the logical place for the establishment of a mobilization training camp. In God's name and your country's, gentlemen, resist this move. It is a health, discipline and morals of the manhood of our land that soon may be called upon to defend you."

The captain declared that several representatives of the interests which would be affected by the measure had offered him a sum of \$50 if he would keep them informed of the way this legislation was going and tell them when anything fell. He charged also that the 11 saloons and cafes in close proximity to the reservation only one was conducted "squarely." Gambling was carried on in all the others, he said. In five, immoral conditions existed in two, "fences" were operated and parts of soldiers' stolen uniforms and equipment had been recovered from them. In two, men had been drugged and "beaten up"; in two, men had been "cut up"; in three men were "operated"; in one, women pickpockets operated; and in four, "dope" was sold.

GEORGE M. WOODWARD DIES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Special Agent For New Haven Road Suffered Sudden Attack of Neuritis of the Heart.

George M. Woodward, special agent for the N. Y., N. H. and H. R. R. Co., died at his home here Wednesday night at the home of Thomas Jones, his boarding place, after a brief illness of a few days, traveling from Plainfield to his home and sat down for conversation with Mr. Jones. He did not complain and after a time went upstairs to his room.

Soon after 10.30 Mr. Jones heard Mr. Woodward calling for him and upon responding found Mr. Woodward in his room and in distress, complaining that he could breathe only with difficulty. Mr. Jones hurriedly opened a window and then summoned Dr. Russell. Dr. Russell called in Dr. Omer Larue. All efforts to revive Mr. Woodward were fruitless and he died within twenty minutes.

Last May Mr. Woodward suffered a slight attack of neuritis of the heart, which was regarded as so serious that his son, Clayton, hurried here on a special train. Mr. Woodward recovered to a sufficient degree, however, to resume his duties as special agent and for months past he has gone about his business as usual.

George Madison Woodford was born in Columbia, this state, July 16, 1840. He was a member of the Connecticut Civil War he enlisted for service, becoming a member of B company, 2nd Connecticut Volunteer Infantry, and on November 1 of that year was advanced to be a first class private in the British war office. He will soon go back to his regiment, now in Flanders.


"STARS AND STRIPES" OVER TRENCHES IN FRANCE
