JOHNSON WILL ADMITTED TO PROBATE

Judge Nelson J. Ayling Considers Will and Codicil Proved in Decision Announced Wednesday—No Incapacity Nor Undue Influence at Time Will Was Made—Appeal to be Taken.

In a decision announced on Wednesday Judge Nelson J. Ayling admits to probate the will of Nathan Johnson, late of Bozrah, as he finds that both the will and codicil have been proved.

The decision made public by Judge Ayling follows: In the matter of establishing the last will and testament with codicil thereto of Nathan Johnson, late of Bozrah, in the probate district of Bozrah, deceased.

The decedent died on April 17, 1917 the termination of an illness of complicated disease, and during the last 3-1/2 months of his life was confined to his room or bed. It appears that the executor named in the will, to-wit: Earl Mathewson, died on Jan. 8, 1917, in due and legal form, and that on April 11, 1917, he executed a so-called codicil to said will six days before his death.

On April 30 these documents, purported to be the last will and testament of Nathan Johnson of Bozrah, were brought before this court for allowance and probate.

Both instruments it appears were signed by him in the presence of three witnesses, of whom one signed the respective papers in testator's presence, in the absence of each other and in the presence of the other two.

The executor named in the will, to-wit: Earl Mathewson, executor, is to provide a bond of \$20,000, the amount of the estate.

The question then is as to whether the testator was of mental capacity to dispose of his property. It is true, that the documents may be examined for the purpose of aiding in determining, if possible, as to whether undue influence has been exercised or fraud practiced.

It is to be noted that the instrument itself tends to show unnatural disposition of the estate; but to be of effect as evidence to show incapacity it must of itself show unnatural and unreasonable acts.

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LOCAL BOARD INSTRUCTED IN MILITARY REGISTRATION.

Major Christopher L. Avery Explains the Conscription Act.

Major Christopher L. Avery, representing Governor Holcomb, explained the conscription registration act to officials of New London, Norwich and other Eastern Connecticut cities and towns at a meeting held for that purpose in the council chamber in the municipal building at New London Wednesday afternoon.

More than 40 men assembled at the chamber for instruction as to the methods to be employed in making the registration on Tuesday.

The provisions of the act and the processes to be followed in carrying out its intent were fully understood by the majority of the officials, but Major Avery went into the proposition in great detail and gave his audience a comprehensive idea of the results desired and the way to proceed step by step.

The meeting was opened at 1 o'clock. Soon after it opened Major Rogers used the opportunity to explain to a number of city and town officials from this end of the county had assembled for the purpose of the meeting.

Major Avery said that all men must register in the places where they ordinarily vote. An excursion by a registration board to any section to register a group of residents would be contrary to the law.

He said the law provides that a man will be required for about every 100 persons.

While no statement was made this feature of the registration, it is expected that interpreters will be required to attend foreigners, not speaking enough English to properly answer the question put to them.

The local board comprises Selectman C. K. Bailey, Town Clerk C. S. Holbrook and Registrars of Voters Tyler B. Gay and Cornelius J. Downes.
