WILLIMANTIC TO HAVE PAID FIRE DEPARTMENT

Action Taken by Board of Aldermen—By-Laws Adopted and Firemen's Salaries Fixed.

By action taken at the special meeting of the board of aldermen in the town building Monday evening it was voted to give the city of Willimantic a paid fire department. The present fire department will go out of existence the first of next month and the new fire department will be installed. It was decided that at the present time five permanent men would be hired and the rest of the members of the Engine Company No. 1.

Mayor Daniel P. Dunn called the meeting to order at 7:30 o'clock after which the clerk read the warning. Corporation Counsel T. J. Kelley explained the purpose of the fire committee report to a fire department, stating that the city would have two kinds of fire in the department, namely permanent men and call men. He then read the ordinance pertaining to the

They were all instructed to wear the suitable uniforms and badges to be worn by the permanent men, who for the present were to stay at their homes reporting for duty not later than eight o'clock every morning. It was decided that for the present five permanent men would be necessary, and the purpose of appointing these men the meeting adjourned until next Thursday evening when Willimantic will have its first paid firemen appointed.

GERMANY SUPPLIED WITH AMERICAN COTTON Through Italian Traders—So Reported by Association of Cotton Manufacturers.

Boston, June 4.—Germany has been supplied with American cotton through Italian traders, according to a report by an investigating committee of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers, which was made public tonight.

The committee which was appointed by the association at its annual convention several weeks ago gives statistics on exports of cotton to Norway, Sweden, Denmark, The Netherlands and Italy for the three years 1914, 1915, 1916, to show tremendous increases since the war.
