NEARLY EVEN BREAK

Among Best Pests.  
Plymouth Rocks and Leghorns Virtually Tied in Storr's Contest.

In the 31st week of the laying contest at Storr's there was a more nearly even break among the best pens. The Plymouth Rocks and the Leghorns virtually tied for first and second places while the Rocks got second and fourth. The White Leghorns entered by James O. LeFevre, New Paltz, N. Y., and Windstep Farm, Redding Ridge, Conn., laid respectively 92 and 91 eggs and the Hampshire Barred Rocks that established a new high record last week were in second place with a yield of 69 eggs and a high record of 64 per cent.

From time to time there have been made in these columns various suggestions such as segregating the males after the hatching season, supplying an abundance of green food, and in winter, a closer inspection of the hens' quarters to guard against mites and lice, etc., all of which are believed to be an aid in getting the maximum number of eggs from any given flock of hens. The present laying contest at Storr's has made a survey of the situation as conditions actually exist on a number of poultry farms in the state and the facts that were gathered warrant the conclusion that "egg production" is the barometer of success. If your hens are laying only seven or eight dozen eggs a year they will not return much more than enough to pay the grain bill, but if by better care and management you can induce them to lay an extra two eggs a month, or ten dozen a year, then the margin will rapidly increase, since one cent now pays these eggs for about 50 cents a dozen.

Autos for South America.  
Reports from Argentina show a large increase in importation of automobiles in 1916 and 1917. The total number imported in 1916 was nearly 6,000 at an average price much below that of earlier years, the average price of those imported in 1916 being but about one-third of that of 1915. Our own figures of exports to Argentina show that in nine months ending with March, 1917, 3,000 machines valued at \$1,795,000. To Chile the total number of machines exported in the nine months ending with March, 1917, was 1,715 valued at \$1,268,000, and to Brazil 553 machines valued at \$393,000.
