Despondent After Visit to Wife's Grave. Peter Cuni Suicides by Drowning—List of Teachers for Town Schools.

The body of Peter Cuni, 66, was found in the upper end of the Rhode Island Mill pond about eight o'clock Friday morning.

Mr. Cuni had not been feeling well for some time and was despondent since the death of his wife several months ago.

Thursday morning he went to the cemetery with a basket of flowers for his wife's grave. Later in the day the empty basket was found on what is known as the second bridge on the Central Vermont railroad.

His vest was found nearby. This gave rise to the theory of suicide and a search was begun which resulted in finding the body Friday morning.

The local medical examiner pronounced death by drowning, probably suicide.

Mr. Cuni has resided near the fair grounds in Stafford Springs for several years. He is survived by two sons, Henry and Emilio Cuni, and four daughters, Mrs. Giacinta Pierolo, Mrs. Laura Pardell, Mrs. Albertine Serofine and Mrs. Charles Foretanello.
