DOLLAR DAY SUITS WESSERLY Alleged False Accusation Results in Damage Claim of Dorothy Drew For \$10,000—Local Interest in Boston Arrest of Paul S. Motz, Auto Thief—Miss Jennie B. Stanton Heads Liberty Loan Committee—High School Football Team Blanks Bulkeley, 22 to 0.

An adjourned session of the superior court from Washington county, convened at Westley, Friday, Judge Barrows presiding. The docket was read and rearranged in this order for trial: Dorothy Drew vs. J. Samuels Brothers, et al.; Mary Arconbie vs. Mary Ross; Wilbur G. Cheever vs. A. L. Castrucci; company: Joseph Gabrielle vs. Joseph Cinolone; Dwight B. Stillman et al. vs. Ed. Monti, et al., two cases; Mary Antonio Ciampalova vs. Joseph Gabrielle, and Giuseppe Ciampalova vs. Joseph C. Moore; The American Waste and Metal company vs. Abraham Caplan; David Syme vs. Arthur J. Kelly; Angela N. Guarino vs. Angelo J. Cappuccio; May C. Thomas vs. Charles R. Thomas; Henry N. Glavin vs. W. A. W. House company; T. B. Segar and company vs. Elmer F. Burdick; Irving A. Starland vs. Flint Farms Incorporation.

The case of Jeremiah J. Haggerty vs. Rhoda M. Brooks, reported settled, and these cases were argued on the November term of court at Westley: Guarantee Food company against James W. Brown; Boston Trust company against Mary Dotoia. The first case called for trial was Dorothy Drew vs. Westley, against J. Samuels Brothers, et al., Outlet Store in Providence and Mrs. Nazion Avedersian, in which punitive damages of \$10,000 are asked. The jury in the case was selected as follows and without objections from either side: Arthur L. Steere, Justice; Herbert T. Kenyon, Sidney E. Chapman, of Westley; Edward Sumner, Clifton Partelow, of South Kingston; Arthur H. Steere, James H. Greene, North Kingston; Nathan James, Alonzo W. Kenyon, of Hopkinton; Theophilus H. Steere, Howard W. Holland, of Narragansett.

George J. McLeod, counsel for the plaintiff, E. Buller Moulton and E. A. Peterson for the Outlook company, and John J. A. Cooney for Mrs. Avedersian. Mr. McLeod in explaining the case to the jury said he would attempt to prove that Mrs. Drew was charged with theft and deprived of her freedom for over an hour, and submitted to mental anguish that resulted in physical injury to her.

In January 25, last, Dollar Day in Providence, Mrs. Drew went to that city. While at the Outlet store she made a purchase, she was accused of theft of having goods in her possession that did not belong to her, the accusation being made by Floorwalker Kelley, and by Mrs. Avedersian. The latter accused Mrs. Drew of having hidden the bundle in her own dress, and Mr. Kelley coincided and demanded that the bundle be handed over to Mrs. Avedersian. Mrs. Drew through the crowded store, and followed by a uniformed officer, to the office of the superintendent, where Mr. Kelley and Mrs. Avedersian, having in her possession a bundle containing two men's shirts which belonged to Mrs. Avedersian.

Here the superintendent called a Mr. Bell and he accompanied by Mrs. Avedersian and Mrs. Dutton followed by the police officer and others, escorted Mrs. Drew to the Boston store where the shirts had been purchased. Mrs. Drew was taken to the store, and the superintendent of that store, and by direction of Mr. Bell she was held there for nearly an hour. Mrs. Dutton said Mrs. Drew the shirts. She suffered a nervous shock, in addition to the physical injury she received, and required medical attention for some time thereafter. Mr. McLeod said he would ask the jury to give the injured woman damages.

Mrs. Dorothy Drew testified that she was the daughter of Frederick P. Bulcock and that she was a former resident of Westley all her life. She said she was shopping in Providence, January 25th, last, and visited several stores. At about 11 o'clock, with some bundles in her arms, she was taken to the Outlet store, and there she was held for some time.
