The trustees of the Norwich State Hospital for the Insane, at their annual meeting on Tuesday at the institution voted to extend a call to Dr. Franklin S. Wilcox, assistant superintendent of the Southern California State Hospital, Patton, California, to become superintendent of the Norwich institution. Dr. Mark S. Bringham was appointed assistant superintendent of the hospital.

Dr. Wilcox for eight years was assistant superintendent of the Kingsota state hospital. For five years he has been connected with the Southern California institution, which accommodates 2,400 patients. He has reputation as an expert alienist and is married.

MANUAL TRAINING SHOPS SHOULD BE CONSOLIDATED. Supervisor Harvie Favors the Installation of Machinery.

Gordon A. Harvie, supervisor of manual training in the Norwich schools, in his annual report to Edward J. Graham, superintendent of schools, recommends that the three shops be combined in one centrally located, large room and machinery installed so that the boys who leave school at the end of the grammar school course may become familiar with the large amount of practical machinery with which they come in contact.

It is with great pleasure that I report a very successful year in this department. We have been working for and hope to have attained a higher standard in our manual arts work.

In shop work the same general plan was followed as in the previous year. The artistic as well as the industrial side of the work was emphasized, the course being planned to develop appreciation of good design as well as skill in construction.

Much more work for the school department was completed during the year, including shelves made and installed in storage closets in four buildings, four bookcases for different schools, cases for sending supplementary reading books from school to school, lumber racks for the shops, bicycle rack, 28 chairs and four tables repaired, several chairs resented with cane, chairs and desks refinished, window boxes and plant shelves for three schools, and kindergarten stools made.

The list of articles made and taken home by the boys includes oak library chair, oak library table, oak serving table, oak umbrella stands, oak music cabinets, mahogany plant stand, kitchen tables, ironing boards, with folding standard, tables, tabourettes, stools, dog house, trap nests, medicine cabinets, picture frames, shirtwaist hangers, and other articles found useful in the homes.

On the school visiting day in March a large number of parents visited the manual training shop at Broadway school and showed much interest in the work being done there. Such an interest on the part of the parents is a great stimulus to better work by the boys.

During the coming year a greater part of the manual training period will be devoted to shop arithmetic and mechanical drawing. Longer periods and more room should be allowed for manual work in the more complete courses in mechanical drawing and arithmetic could be given and if this department of the school is going to progress with these of other subjects the size of our shop provision should be made.

Shop plans now in use are inadequate for the new times. They are heavily laded even with the electric lights and are too small in which to do the work we want to do. Our three shops should be combined in one centrally located, large room and machinery such as planers and saws installed so
