Bartlett High School of Webster, Mass., won first place in the inter-school track meet at Slater Field, Webster, Saturday afternoon. Windham High School of Windham and Holden High School were tied for second place with sixteen points each. Webster piled up a total of 35 1-3 points.

The meet was between schools from the following places: Holden, Mass.; Windham, Windham, Conn.; Southbridge, Mass.; Willimantic, Conn.; Webster, Mass. and Southbridge were the only schools to have men competing in only one event while Webster had the most men.
