

MATTERS INTERESTING WESTERLY

Town Council Refuses to Renew Liquor License For Saloon in Which Gabrielle was Stabbed—T. A. Scott Company Starts Removing Sunken Barge from River—Louis J. Reuter Leads in Holiday Shoot—Hodge Summer Home Flooded When Water Pipe Bursts.

Frederick Gabrielle, stabbed with a long knife by Nunzio Gincerella Thursday night while in the Conventino saloon in Canal street, was reported to have somewhat recovered at the Rhode Island hospital Friday afternoon, and there is hope of his recovery. Gabrielle and Gincerella, with Luigi Gincerella, a cousin, and James Caffone, were the party that assaulted Policeman Michael Curtin several months ago and were duly penalized. Luigi Gincerella was indicted and charged before the Third district court on four counts, including an assault with a dangerous weapon, a bludgeon, made from a broken machine, and the most formidable weapon of that nature that ever came into the possession of the local police.

The T. A. Scott Wrecking company that has contract to remove, as a menace to navigation, the barge Montana, which lies on the bank of the channel of the Pawcatuck river, commenced the work Friday morning. The barge has a cargo of 28,000 paving blocks which were shipped by the New England Granite works to a New York firm. A lighter is alongside and the paving blocks, which now belong to the Scott company, are being removed, the value being considered by the federal government in awarding the contract. The barge has passed beyond the period of usefulness and will be destroyed and the material in construction disposed of on land or sea. The value of the cargo is about equal to the contract price for the removal of the obstruction to navigation.
