The rush of young men of this local exemption district to join the navy is on. Close to a dozen registered men appeared at the office of the local exemption board during Friday and asked for the necessary credentials to establish to the satisfaction of the navy recruiting officers that they have been properly released from their obligations to the local board, providing they go into the naval service.

More young men have signified their intention to come to the office today and get releases to join the navy, so the indications point to the very successful carrying out of the plans of the navy recruiting party that will be here from December 9 to 15.
