NO HOPE FOR PEACE UNDER GERMAN TERMS

To Fight Until a Peace "Based on the Principles of Freedom, Justice and Respect for International Law" is Obtained

The Germans are Active on a Front in Lorraine Occupied by American Troops—In a Barrage Fire the Americans are Answering Shot—Employees in Germany Failing to Return to Work are to be Court-martialed—If Found Guilty They are to be Executed Within 24 Hours of the Time Sentence is Imposed—Social Unrest in Austria Has Spread to Trieste.

The war is to be prosecuted vigorously by the entente allies and the United States until a peace "based on the principles of freedom, justice and respect for international law" is obtained. This is the decision of the Supreme War Council of the entente allies...

It is reported in El Paso, Tex., that there are movements of a new revolt in Sonora.

German air raids on Wednesday night killed 45 persons and injured 207 in Paris.

Roy O. Garver, a Royal Flying cadet born in America, has died of injuries in London.

The Germans have started a propaganda magazine in New York, 5 000 copies of which have been distributed in Philadelphia for Washington.

Two hundred persons were burned to death in a fire in a factory at Novo Archankelskiy, Russia.

Since the British recruiting mission has been opened in New York, 5 000 men have been sent to Canada to enlist.

Lord Cecil, British Minister of Blockade declared that within a few months the real test of the war will occur.

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RAILROADS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS IN HAULING COAL

Fuel Administration Officials are Hopeful That Today Will Be Last Heatless Monday

ALL RAILROADS IGNORED THE SUNDAY HOLIDAY

Roads Will Work Hard This Week to Accumulate Small Reserve Stocks of Coal at Consumption Centers in Anticipation of Later Interruption of Traffic by High Waters and Ice Jams—Embargoes on Eastern Lines Will Not Be Lifted Until the Coal Movement Improves Considerably—State Fuel Administrators Today Will Hold a Conference With Dr. Garfield on the General Situation.

Production this week is expected to be considerably greater than last. Danger of floods still looms large, however, and the railroads will work hard early this week to accumulate small reserve stocks of coal at consumption centers in anticipation of later interruption of traffic by high waters and ice jams against bridges. The railroad administration will not begin to lift the general freight embargoes on eastern trunk lines until the coal movement improves considerably—State Fuel Administrators Today Will Hold a Conference With Dr. Garfield on the General Situation.

Tomorrow state fuel administrators will be here for a conference with Dr. Garfield on the general situation, and to report on the results of the heatless Mondays and the five day shut-down to have loaded cars hauled away.

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
