Private Henry E. Gilbert Slightly Wounded in Action—Pension for W. H. Bowen—Rev. James H. George Writes of Experiences in Paris—Four Owners Fined for Violating Dog Restraint Law—Suit Against Town Probable.

Private Henry G. Gilbert, member of a New England unit of the 1st Infantry in France, is reported as slightly wounded in a telegram received from the war department by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gilbert, of Broad street.

Private Gilbert is reported as wounded in action since American forces began to arrive in France. Details were contained in the telegram to indicate the nature of his injuries, other than that they were slight, so later reports are expected to show that he is not badly hurt.

In this column a few days ago there appeared a letter from France written by Private Gilbert in which he set forth some of his experiences at the front, an incident of special interest that is mentioned being the extracting from theommel of his saddle a bullet fired from the rifle of a German sniper.

Private Gilbert is one of the youngest of the soldiers that killingly has been mentioned in the Bulletin. He was just over 18 when he enlisted and a student at Brown university. His enlistment was a Rhode Island organization.

W. H. Bowen Retired on Pension. The current issue of the Telephone Bulletin features an article pertaining to W. H. Bowen, formerly of this town who has retired from the S. N. E. Telephone company after 30 years of service.

Mr. Bowen was retired March 1st, and his large circle of friends in the company wish him many more years of useful life, with full enjoyment of the leisure which he has so well earned.

Mr. Bowen was born in Killingly, September 11, 1859, and went to work for the Western Union Telegraph company on September 1, 1884. Three years later, to a day, he left the Western Union and joined our forces.

Mr. Bowen has a host of friends in this section of the state, which he has been doing capable work for many years. While his friends in the telephone service will miss him from the office, they sincerely wish him a bright and happy future.

Described in Letters Received From Former Rector of St. Alban's Church. The following are excerpts from letters written to friends here by Rev. J. H. George, formerly rector of St. Alban's church, now in France, with the American forces.

March 11. I have been in two air raids since I have been in Paris, and I can't say I like them. I have been going to Madame Cheney's for French almost every night to make them up for me.
