

Money has been given to the Blanford fund, the golden anniversary fund, Eastern Connecticut branch, W. H. M. S., etc.

Following the reports came the election of officers, which resulted in the choice of Mrs. Robert Pegrum for president; Mrs. M. R. Plumb and Miss Clara Johnson, vice presidents; Mrs. John Pottery, treasurer; and Miss Dorothy Brown, secretary, in place of Mrs. Ada Larrabee, who declined re-election. Mrs. Pegrum was made chairman of the program and Miss Grace Bates of the entertainment committee. The plan of having two different members take charge of the sewing each year is again preferred. DR. SENIOR RE-VISITS WESTERLY

Former Local Physician Comes from New Jersey to Petition State Board for License to Practice Again—Trip Over Pequot Trail Today—War Savings Campaign Planned—Mr. and Mrs. William Burr Married Fifty-five Years.

Dr. Percy A. Senior, formerly of Westerly and Stonington, is here on a visit to the board of health in Providence Thursday in connection with his petition for reinstatement as a practicing physician in Rhode Island. His license was revoked by the board more than a year ago for alleged gross unprofessional conduct. Dr. Senior and family are now located in a New Jersey city. He claims that he has reformed and holds a responsible position. A petition for reinstatement was received from Dr. Charles J. O'Leary of Providence, whose license was revoked for a violation of the Harrison drug act.

The board met in annual session and Dr. D. Merion Smith of Riverpoint was elected president; Dr. Thomas J. McLaughlin of Woonsocket, vice president; Dr. Byron N. Richards of Pawtucket, secretary. The resignation of Harry S. Bernstein as state pathologist was accepted.

Dr. Henry W. Kimball of Providence was appointed a director of certain diseases at a salary of \$2,000 a year. This work is to be carried on as a war measure under the co-operation of the United States Public Health association, the salary to be paid jointly by the federal government and state.

Dr. Richards, Dr. O'Leary and Miss Winifred L. Fitzpatrick were appointed members of the board.

STONINGTON

Two Cases Brought by State Police.—For Alleged Violations of Auto Laws Are Continued to Friday Next.

Judge Frank H. Hinchey presided at a session of the Stonington town court Friday, to consider two cases of alleged violation of the automobile laws, brought by two state policemen. They engaged Alpheus J. Larkin, operator of a public service car Thursday to bring them from Pawtucket to Stonington and paid \$2 for the ride.

John Carney, who operates a motor truck between White Rock and Stonington, was arrested at Pawtucket on court Thursday. He had no special public service operator's license, and in addition his car bore the plates of Connecticut and Rhode Island, which is contrary to law. He also pleaded not guilty and gave bail of \$50 for appearance Friday.

When the cases were called Friday morning, Judge Herbert W. Rathbun, who represented the defendants, stated that the cases were of a nature that ought to be considered by the superintendent of motor vehicles for Connecticut. He said he would ask for a ruling by Judge Hinchey, and was of the belief that the case could not consistently be enforced by operators of machines where conditions existing in the State were such as to make it impracticable to enforce the law. He also pleaded not guilty and gave bail of \$50 for appearance Friday.
