On Second Day of House-to-House Canvass in Norwich — Makes Total of \$16,970.27 For Two Days—Registration Places Appointed For Friday of This Week.

War Savings Pledges Due This Week. You Must Pledge Yourself on or Before Friday, June 28th

Should your work be such that you are absent from your home or lodgings, and should there be no one there who is properly authorized to make your pledge for you, you must come in person to the school-house nearest your place of residence Friday, June 28th, between the hours of 12 and 9 P. M.

SUNSHINE MORE THAN RAIN NEEDED For Home Gardens—No Call to Do Any Watering Just Now.

The following directions for watering the home gardens were prepared by Dr. E. H. Jenkins of the Connecticut experiment station at the request of the home gardens department of the Connecticut committee of food supply.

Keep Cultivator Going. "Call the compact lump the firm soil of your garden, full of the capillary tubes which lift the soil water quickly. Call the loose powdered sugar the fine dirt mulch made by the cultivator which binds the soil water from coming to the surface where the wind and heat would quickly steal it from your crop.
