WANTS \$15,600 APPROPRIATED Mayor Gates Calls Special City Meeting to Decide Budget For Fiscal Year.

Fifteen thousand six hundred dollars is the amount which the city administration desires to have appropriated, to be used during the fiscal year. Thursday Mayor Gates issued a call for a special city meeting to be held Tuesday, Aug. 27, to decide whether the appropriations are to be made. Of this amount the fire department claims \$8,400 which includes plans for motorizing the department. The money, if appropriated, is to be used for the following purposes: Sewer department \$1,000, police department \$600, collection of taxes \$500, roadwork \$1,000, ice department \$2,000, oiling the streets and spraying of trees \$1,000, fire alarm \$500, fire department \$3,500, motorization of fire department \$8,900, total \$15,600.

Five Men Leave For Maine. A gathering of one hundred witnessed the departure of the five Willimantic men Thursday noon for Orono, Maine, to attend the University of Maine for the U. S. Army. The train was about half an hour late and contained a car which was occupied by other men bound for the university. Following the express was a special for Camp Devenis carrying several hundred colored men. Willimantic did not add to the men as this board was not called on for men. In this district there are about a dozen colored men in the army.

To Recruit Student Nurses. Within a short time, recruiting for the Student Nurses' Reserve will be under full head in this city. Miss Hannah Dodge, a registered nurse, formerly superintendent of the Greenwell General Hospital, has charge of the work. The recruiting office will be located at Miss Dodge's home at 108 Prospect street, at the Liberty cottage and at the U. S. Employment Agency. Literature may be obtained at these places, and by means of four-minute speakers, slides in the theaters, and posters, the possibilities and advantages of the work will be made known.

Red Cross Requires Extra Work Rooms. The Liberty Cottage will be open tonight from 7:30 to 9:30 to distribute free wool for the American Red Cross. In order to fill the enormous quota of articles from the local chapter, the rooms at the high school are to be open Thursday evenings in addition to Monday and Wednesday afternoons.

Congressional Nominees Prompt to Obey Rules. Frank P. Fenton of Bellevue street has resigned as chairman of the Willimantic Four Minute Speakers' Committee and of the Willimantic Chapter of the American Red Cross. His resignation as four-minute speaker has been accepted. Mr. Fenton resigned as one of the rules of the two organizations is that no candidate for political office can hold these positions.
