Willimantic Soldier Makes Supreme Sacrifice. Private John J. Squires, 307th Field Ambulance Co., Dies in Hospital in France.

Private John J. Squires, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur J. Squires of 124 Union street, is the latest Willimantic man to give his life for humanity. A telegram was received from Adjutant General McCain, Sunday evening, at 6 o'clock, that he had died in France, Aug. 4, of broncho-pneumonia.

Hebron Fire Damage \$8,000. Damage amounting to about \$8,000 was done at the old Governor Peters place in Hebron, now occupied by Edmond Horton, Friday night, when a large barn, containing 100 tons of hay, and about \$100 of grain, was destroyed by fire started by lightning.

Lebanon Team Wins. Defeats South Windham in Series of Three Games. By defeating South Windham on her home grounds, Saturday afternoon, Lebanon won the three game series.

Arrested as Slackers, But Released. Arthur Bazinet and Aisene Lameotte of this city, together with South Windham slacker, Friday, as they did not have their registration cards when arrested. Freight Stations Consolidate. Under Government Ownership C. V. Depot Closed.

Chautauque opened in impressive manner here Saturday. The matinee opening was well attended and the evening entertainment by an audience that nearly filled the big tent, which had been set up in a hurry, between two in the morning ad three in the afternoon, the seats being placed and other work done in connection with getting the standard Chautauque auditorium in readiness.

Saturday's program included a concert by the McKinzie Operatic Company and a lecture by Peter McQueen, his subject being The Great War.
