FARM BUREAU TENTS ARE BUSY PLACES "Backyard pigs for patriotism, pleasure and profit" is the way the boys of the county pig club put it where they display their sleek looking porkers in the county farm bureau's tent, where each pig contains the slogan: "Stop. See my pig. I am helping win the war." Assistant County Agent E. G. Whitcomb conducted a series of milk and cream on the opposite side of the tent and has a graphic illustration to show how high class cattle pay. He shows pure bred heifer and bull calves of four different breeds alongside a scrub bull with two of his get. The contrast is obvious in favor of the pure bred. Three cows, which produced respectively 1,000, 6,000 and 10,000 pounds of milk per year, are an argument along the line of selecting the herd. By charts it is shown that the 4,000 pound cow lost her owner \$16 a year, while the 6,000 pound cow was a \$132 profit, although cost only \$15 more for grain feed. A magnificent black Percheron stallion from the Mitchell farm at Salem is another feature of the exhibit.

Boys and Girls' Tent. The Boys and Girls' Agricultural club conducted under the auspices of Miss Bertha Hallock of the farm bureau have a tent to themselves, where they display a great variety of all kinds of fine vegetables, canned goods and cakes, cookies and other cooked delicacies.
