Chinese are estimated to destroy \$10,000,000 worth of food annually by their custom of burning small pieces of gold leaf on certain anniversaries. Of the \$7,129,135 acres in England and Wales \$7,114,494 were returned as 1918. This was 15.73 acres less than in 1917, and the smallest area since 1872. Wheat occupied 1,607,498 acres of 4.3 per cent, compared with 7 per cent above the average of the previous years.

American exports of tinplate now exceed those of England, and American tinplates have now secured a footing in an increased number of foreign countries. A noteworthy feature is that 1917 is the first year in which England has had to yield tin-plate exports with regard to tinplate exports. According to the British Timber Trades Journal of June 8, the Russians at Khabarovsk have formed in Stockholm to exploit new methods of shipping wood in view of the anticipated shortage of tonnage after the war. The plan is to raft the lumber across the North Sea and it is especially noted that the company's idea is to facilitate the shipment of such goods. Some previous experiments in floating large masses of logs have been successful, but it is thought that no previous attempts have been made to float sawn goods long distances at sea.
