SEPTEMBER DEATH RATE MADE NEW TOWN RECORD

Not in years has the town clerk's office here recorded deaths at the rate they were recorded for the month of September. As far as could be learned Monday, the number of deaths for the month for the town was 59.

Over half of them were from influenza and pneumonia, and practically all of these occurred in the last ten days of the month.

Thirty-nine of the deaths have occurred in public institutions and nine in private homes. The autumn season is the following were the causes of deaths: Influenza 15, pneumonia 41, tuberculosis 10, typhoid fever 1, cancer 4, accident 2, diarrhoeal troubles 2, all other causes.


