NEW SUPERIOR COURT SUITS FILED

Collection of \$550 balance of a note and foreclosure of a mortgage for \$1,250 on land in Preston against Ida Toeker and Sarah Tooker of Norwich. The Jewish Agricultural and Industrial Aid Society, Bessie Becker of Preston, Moses and Simon Soloub of Norwich are made party defendants, having claims against the property also.
