WESTERLY

The case against Peter Rose, charged by the state food administrator with selling 700 barrels of flour in violation of the United States Food Administration rules, has been settled.

Private Walter Martley, 31, son of Mrs. Esther Martley, of Pawtucket, who was killed in action on October 4, was born in Westerly and lived in Pawtucket for fourteen years.
