G. V. Lassen of Boston and Frederic L. Woods of Brookline, Mass., have purchased the stone building owned by the Smith Granite company, located on Granite street, which was used as a grocery store for many years. The new concern, which will probably be known as the Westery Fittings company, will run a brass foundry and machine shop and their principal part will be pipe fittings and plumbers' supplies. The building to be occupied by the concern is a stone structure 77 feet long by 31 feet wide, inside, and two stories high.

The plan of the state highway commission for five miles of the latest bituminous road on the Post road, from the end of the mile of state road on Franklin street to many yards to the east of the Westery-Charlestown town line, has been approved by the secretary of agriculture of the United States. The estimate of this road will be \$125,000. Engineer Patterson of the state highway commission in Providence, R. I., has made a map for every foot of the road and the map shows that many of the curves will be straightened and that the distance from Westery to the town line will be shortened about 85 yards. The letter from the secretary of agriculture approving the Westery project was dated Washington, D. C., March 15, 1919.
